PROPOSALS FOR FURTHER DEVELOPMEN

Since the acquisition and restoration by the Sir Henry Royce Memorial Foundation of the former home of the Grafton Hunt, the Hunt House, Paulerspury, now the Headquarters of the Rolls-Royce Enthusiasts' Club, the facilities provided, although adequate at the time, have come under pressure from the expanding needs of the Club and the Foundation. There is a demand for space in which to house and display the vast amount of historic material in our possession and additional material available. Also, there is an ongoing requirement for the assembly of large numbers attending conferences, lectures and seminars etc.

The redevelopment of the old grain store, now known as the Barrass Building, and the development of the Archive Room over the Workshop, has gone a long way to accommodate much of the material in our care. The income derived from the copying and research of this material is important to the economy of the Club and the Foundation. There is now an urgent need to further expand the facilities available to house and display the artifacts and historic items at present in store, or pledged for inclusion in our collection in due course.

Recently, Rolls-Royce Motor Cars Limited have stated that the Club and the Foundation are the official custodians of historic material emanating from the Company. This in itself indicates our acceptance as the worldwide base for the collation and preservation of the history of Rolls-Royce.

Conscious of the foregoing, in 1988 the Management Committee of the R.-R.E.C., following discussions with the Trustees of the Sir Henry Royce Memorial Foundation, requested the Chairman of the Property Management Committee acting on behalf of the Club and the Foundation, to put forward proposals for the development of a large area of land to the rear of the Workshop, upon which formerly stood a derelict stone barn. The brief was to design a building which would include a large ground floor area with multi functional capabilities, linked to the Barrass Building, this area to be suitable for the display of large items such as engines and vehicles and to provide secure display areas for other historic material. The building should also be capable of accommodating upward of 250 people, with facilities to lecture to a seated audience. Audio

visual and projection equipment facilities should be provided. The first floor should provide additional storage space, linked with the area recently created by the first floor Workshop development. The delivery of heavy goods to these areas to be provided for by the Workshop hoist. The first floor to also have access by staircase from the new building. This would provide, amongst other possibilities, the capability of relocating and expanding the Club Shop, thus releasing space in the main building for the expansion of the administration area.


Any development would of course require the consent of the Planning Authority and particularly as the building is listed Grade II, stringent requirements would have to be met. It would be essential that any new building should be in sympathy with the surroundings both internally and externally. Existing materials and details should be incorporated wherever possible. The building should reflect the quality associated with the cars that are its 'raison d'etre'. This can be achieved by striving for perfection of proportion, simplicity of design and quality of materials and workmanship.

The Property Management Committee submit herewith proposals in accordance with the foregoing brief, for consideration. They are encouraged by the interest shown by the Management Committee of the R.-R.E.C. and by the Trustees of the Foundation.

The total area provided by the proposed building is approximately 4,953 square feet, 2,800 square feet of this would be on the ground floor and 2,153 square feet on the first floor. For comparison, the first floor archive area of the Barrass Building is 1,185 square feet. The ground floor of the Barrass Building would be on the same level and integral with the proposed new building, the block flooring continuing into the new building to give the impression of a large 'L' shaped single area. Access to the Workshop and the new Classroom, located in the weighbridge building would be from the Barrass Building and the new development.

I would like to acknowledge the help given by Messrs. Myles and Sims, our Consultant Architects, who also acted on our behalf for the planning and design of the Barrass Building.

A GREAT BRITISH LIVING LEGEND.

The Sir Henry Royce Memorial Foundation was established in 1977 as a permanent centre devoted to the life and works of Sir Frederick Henry Royce Bart, OBE; his distinguished colleagues and successors, and to the advancement of engineering. Special emphasis is given to the encouragement and support of apprentices and young engineers in Sir Henry's engineering philosophy - the pursuit of excellence. Rovce - a modest genius who always referred to himself as 'mechanic' - made a priceless contribution to the security of this country in time of war, and to its prestige and prosperity in the years of peace.

His engineering philosophy derived from his native genius. enhanced by largely self-taught skills, and through selfless dedication in his search for perfection in all he strove to do. From his earliest brilliant successes in the infant electrical industry which he joined in 1884, to his death in 1933 Royce uncompromisingly pursued his basic principle of establishing the best design, using the finest materials available, worked by the highest levels of craftsmanship. The long succession of superb motor cars from 1904 onwards and his great aero engines from the Eagle of 1915 are legendary.

Royce's short lived partnership with Charles Rolls. established in 1904 and terminating in the latter's premature death in a flying accident in 1910, created the name Rolls-Royce now universally used in every language as synoymous

with excellence.

The founder Trustees, working closely with the parent Company, many interested sympathisers and the major Rolls-Royce clubs of the world, defined the objects of the Foundation and raised substantial funds to purchase a suitable property and convert it to its requirements. This was achieved by the acquisition of the Hunt House, Paulerspury, Northamptonshire, a fine fourteen-roomed stone built Victorian house, in an easily accessible but quiet and beautiful village just off the A5, near TOWCESTER. The objects of the Foundation are:-

1. To provide a permanent centre dedicated to the life and works of Sir Henry Royce and his distinguished colleagues and successors.

2. To acquire and preserve all archival material, records, photographs, artifacts and memoriabilia which can be

located, pertaining to the above.

3. To establish the facilities necessary properly and securely to store, maintain and display such material.

4. To provide facilities for its study and research.

5. To encourage and support apprentices, learners and young engineers in the pursuit of Sir Henry's engineering philosophy.

6. To support or initiate projects, competitions and to make awards designed to encourage the pursuit of excellence in

design and manufacture.

7. To establish a Foundation membership prepared to support these objectives and to preserve and enhance this great saga of our National Heritage.
